Sad News

-This past Wednesday afternoon, NC and the Southern Gerontological Society lost a long-time friend and staunch advocate for aging services. Betty Wiser died of cardiac arrest in Princess Margaret Hospital in Nassau, Bahamas. While on a cruise, her husband developed serious complications from an esophageal tear and was flown to Nassau for emergency surgery. Betty, unable to leave the ship with him, had to wait until the ship stopped in Jamaica. Wednesday morning, she flew via Miami to Nassau. Upon arrival she went into cardiac arrest and she died that afternoon following a pacemaker insertion.

-Betty was NC state Representative, long-time head of the North Carolina Department of Environmental Health and Natural Resources aging program, former SGS Board member, and tenacious advocate for older people.
